Green Mountain Foster Grandparents are people age 55 or over who provide one to one and group assistance with children. Grandparents serve as mentors, tutors and role models to youth. Foster Grandparents provide 15–40 hours of volunteer service each week. They receive a modest stipend and other benefits. Foster Grandparents provide services in a variety of settings. These include daycare, elementary schools, high schools, Head Start Programs, libraries, after school programs and recreation centers. This program serves Rutland, Addison and Bennington Counties. It is the goal of the program to enable limited income persons 55 and over to remain physically and mentally active and to enhance their self-esteem through continued participation in needed community service. In addition, this will enable children to achieve improved physical, mental and social development, as well as assistance with their educational needs. The Foster Grandparent program is funded through the Corporation for National & Community Service and the United Way of Rutland County.

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Meet Sandra Bisson-Krawczyk

Sandra was born and raised in N. Adams, MA, and attended St. Joseph's School through out her education, graduating in 1961.

She grew up the middle child of three children and was actually a twin, but her twin did not survive at birth. Both of her parents worked for Sprague Electric in MA, and her father made a part for Apollo 11 and the part is still on the moon!

She has an older brother, Dick, who is an electrician, and a younger brother, David who owned May Jon Glass in Bennington. The family lived close to her mother's parents when they were growing up. "They were little French people who raised 18 children!" Sandra says. Sandra married Richard Bisson in May, 1962. They have four children, Richard Jr., who owns an excavating business in Pownal, a daughter, Jane, who is a nurse in Bennington, daughter Becky who is the Administrative Assistant at Grace Christian School and a daughter, Suzanne, who works for a car dealership in Queensbury, NY. The couple has 10

grandchildren and 3 great grandchildren, with 3 more on the way!

She and Dick were married for 45 years when he discovered he had Stage 4 Cancer. He lived 10 months before he passed. For the next 3 years, Sandra's grandson, Tyler, visited her every day to make sure she was okay.

She got asked out to dinner by Jerry Krawczyk, and the couple ended up marrying. Jerry works for Togg Machine Company in N. Adams, MA. Sandra now has three step-children and five more grandchildren! She also inherited a 19 lb. cat, Goldie, who is long-haired and "not a favorite" for that reason!

Jerry also has a Harley motorcycle, and at age 68, Sandra took her first ride and has enjoyed riding for the past 6 years. "My son-in-law, Michael, literally fell to the ground laughing when he saw me riding down their driveway!" she laughs.

Sandra worked in many different places and at several different types of jobs. She worked in the office at Tsubo

Massage for 10 years, worked as a laborer, caring for the elderly, and private care for a Cancer patient. She was also a manager at a Level 4 community care home. When that home closed, she brought home an 84 year old man who had nowhere to go. They bought him a hound dog for companionship and took the man to Bingo twice a week as he loved to gamble! He became a big part of their family. In later years Sandra owned and operated a children's clothing store called "Teddy Bears" until she was 50 and had emergency open heart surgery, at which time she was forced to close. of that store. Her worse job was working for women in private care who were often demanding and "no one could work fast enough for those ladies!" according to Sandra.

The death of her first husband forever changed Sandra, but she is proud to have been his wife and a mother to their children and grandmother to the grandkids.

When Sandra was 15, she and a girlfriend took a ride from MA to Pownal, VT in her mother's car—with no license! "There were big consequences from our parents for that—not like today!" she notes.

Funny story: When Sandra's grandson, Zachary, was around 3 or 4 he was visiting them and noticed their wedding photo on the wall for the first time. He said, "Grandma was that you when you had your other face?" She still laughs over that one!

When Sandra was a child, she wanted to be a hair dresser. She never did become one, but has given many perms and haircuts over the years. She says she had to love dolls and playing with them growing up because her mother bought her one every year until she got married!

Her mother was her best friend in life and her favorite teacher. "She always had so much wisdom and she loved God." She passed 4 years ago at age 90—complication from a fall. Sandra still misses her every day.

Sandra began volunteering as a volunteer grandparent on 9-3-2013 at Grace Christian School because she was bored after 3 weeks of retirement. She is in Micki Perry's Kindergarten class. "I love every child I have contact with. So many hugs and smiling faces! This volunteer works brings self-worth to me everyday. There is always so much positivity from students and staff."

Sandra says she has learned not to take life for granted, that every moment is a precious gift and a blessing. We love having you as a Volunteer Grandparent Sandy and we know you are a real blessing to us, the children, Mrs. Perry, and the staff at Grace Christian School!


